On various dates in 2017, librarians participated in a conversation via email discussion about how a united library field can tackle the challenges of the future. Together we represent over 80 years of library experience.

The participants came from academic, academic, public libraries as well as lecturers in library science.

While the respondents came from diverse backgrounds, counties and had different experiences the theme was positive in that all libraries and librarians had a very positive role to play in ensuring that the right information got to the right people at the right time and that it will make a difference to their lives and communities.

A vision for libraries
